## INTRODUCTION

We are very pleased to publish Part Two of the details of events taking place at the upcoming 2006 C.N.A. Convention scheduled for July 20-23 at the Sheraton Fallsview Hotel & Convention Centre in Niagara Falls, Ontario.

## THE C.N.A. CANADIAN COIN GRADING AND PRESERVATION WORKSHOP

One of the highlights of the Convention will be a one-day workshop, scheduled for Thursday, July 20, delving into the technical aspects of coin grading, counterfeit detection, authentication and coin & paper money preservation. Participants must be registered for the 2006 C.N.A. Convention via the Convention Registration Application Form to participate in this Seminar. Registration, limited to 20 students, is \$75.00 and \$40.00 for collectors under the age of 18.

Brian Cornwell, President of International Coin Certification Service, a third-party coin grading company based in Toronto, will focus on the practical aspects of grading Canadian decimal coinage as well as detecting coins that have been altered or counterfeited. Students will spend approximately 75% of the allocated class time in a "hands on" or problem solving mode. The remaining 25% will consist of key presentations that emphasize selected grading tips and methods used by experienced graders. Selected reading material will be distributed for review at the student's leisure. All students are encouraged to bring a few of their own coins to the workshop for discussion, particularly those that present grading difficulties. The presentation will focus on the three fundamentals of accurate and consistent grading: knowledge, technique and objectivity. Many physical examples will be available for students to examine directly along with pointers on how best to identify and avoid them at a future date.

Susan Maltby, a former member of the staff of the Canadian Conservation Institute in Ottawa prior to starting her own conservation consulting firm, will tell us what one can do to ensure minimal reduction in value of valuable numismatic material. One of the most important aspects for the preservation of coins, tokens and paper money is providing proper handling and providing proper storage. The collector will have an opportunity to learn, in a practical "hands on" manner, more about the proper care and conservation of numismatic items. Topics discussed will include agents of deterioration, environmental requirements for numismatic collections, environmental monitoring techniques, establishing a controlled environment and the care and handling of numismatic material. One of the demonstrations that will be included is the Beilstein Test, used to determine whether a plastic contains PVC or polyvinyl-dene chloride...and will explain which is safe, which is not and why.

Paul Johnson, Chairman of the CNA Education Committee, will act as moderator. Paul has been involved with numerous educational projects for the Canadian Numismatic Association for the past 18 years. He will present the Certificates of Completion and a copy of the Canadian Grading Book to all participants at the conclusion, which is expected to be around 4:15 p.m.

#### EDUCATIONAL FORUM

The C.N.A. Educational Forum will be held on Saturday, July 22, beginning at 3:30 p.m. There is no admission charge and no advance reservations are required.

The first topic will be "Mountie Money" by Chris Boyer of Waterloo, Ontario. The image of the Canadian Mountie is one of the most recognizable throughout the world. Not surprisingly, the theme of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police has appeared on Canadian coins, medals, tokens and banknotes. It is also amazing to see that many items, such as Dudley Do-Right tokens and other unusual material have been issued in the United States. Have you seen a Canadian Mountie on a hobo nickel, or a Long Service medal? How about a challenge coin from the R.C.M.P.? Using numerous close-up images of these and other fascinating numismatic related items featuring "Mountie Money." Chris will recount the colourful history of the Force from its formation in 1873 to modern-day policing. Boyer is a recipient of the Royal Canadian Mint Youth Award (1995 and 1996) and has entered numerous award winning exhibits on the topic of the RCMP at C.N.A. Conventions. His feature article entitled "Mountie Money" appeared in the September, 2005 issue of the ANA Numismatist. Chris has also designed a number of coins on behalf of the RCMP.

The second presentation will be "Parallels in North American banking: The Canadian - American Experience" by Wendell Wolka of Greenwood, Indiana. This presentation will explore the many similarities, in both approach and timeline, between the Canadian and American banking systems from the late eighteenth century to the early decades of the 20th century. Numerous examples of both Canadian and American paper money, along with the stories behind their issuance, will be used to illustrate and explore this fascinating area of Canadian and American numismatics. Wolka has served as an Instructor at the annual Summer Seminar each July in Colorado Springs and has received the Krause Publications Numismatic Ambassador Award and ANA Presidential Award. He has authored a catalogue of Ohio obsolete paper money and co-authored a similar work covering the state of Indiana.

#### **SPECIALTY GROUP MEETINGS**

A number of Canadian numismatic specialty organizations will hold their annual meetings and conduct educational programs. These include the Canadian Numismatic Research Society, Canadian Paper Money Society, Canadian Association of Token Collectors, Canadian Association of Wooden Money Collectors, Canadian Tire Coupon Collectors Club, Canadian Numismatic Research Society and Medallic Art Society. Delegates from local coin clubs meet at the Club Delegates Breakfast meeting.

A group of collectors specializing in Newfoundland numismatics, led by Bill Kamb who will act as Chairman of the meeting, has asked for meeting space at the Convention to determine if there is sufficient interest in forming a specialty association dealing with Newfoundland numismatics. Draw prizes costing hundreds of dollars will be offered in the door draw, including a Canadian \$100 gold coin featuring Sir Humphrey Gilbert, the founder of Newfoundland and the book "Numismatics of Newfoundland" published by the Ferguson Foundation.

As well, error collectors have asked us to schedule a meeting to determine if there is sufficient interest in starting a Canadian error and variety club. The meeting will be chaired by Henry Nienhuis. The guest speaker, Bill English, is former President of the Coin Irregularity Association of Canada (CIAC). His presentation will make effective use of visual aids to explain how major errors can occur during normal production at the Royal Canadian Mint. After Bill's presentation, Nienhuis will be conducting a discussion on the future of this area of the hobby and will be looking for interest and support in forming a Canadian Error and Varieties Enthusiasts association. ## **EXHIBITS**

Members of the C.N.A. exhibit items from their collections in competition for display awards, thus sharing their knowledge with everyone. The special silver, copper and nickel presentation medals are highly sought after by exhibitors.

The Bank of Canada will also set up a non-competitive exhibit for the enjoyment of show visitors, while the Royal Canadian Mint will set up a display in their booth. Material from the C.N.A. archives will be displayed, as will C.N.A. related material from the personal collection of Norm Williams.

Over the past 25 years or so, the late Earl Salterio had traveled all over Canada to attend the annual conventions of the Canadian Numismatic Association. He took photographs, gathered souvenirs, accumulated articles and put them all neatly into scrapbooks. These scrapbooks were donated to the C.N.A. archives recently by his family upon his recent passing. We are pleased to make them available, for the first time ever, for viewing at the 2006 C.N.A. Convention.

Well-known collector Hubert Grimminck will be exhibiting most of his collection, in special frames that he built, of Canadian trade dollars, Canadian Tire Corporation notes and foreign coins and currency. Starting with about 80 linear feet of display cases, it will expand on Saturday afternoon and Sunday up to 140 linear feet.

The Historian of the Canadian Numismatic Association, Dan Gosling, will be exhibiting material from the C.N.A. Archives. This will be augmented with additional material from the private collection of Norm Williams, a Past President of the Canadian Numismatic Association.

The numismatist who is credited with putting Canadian numismatics on the map of the world, Jim Charlton, will display some of his awards, including the Ferguson Gold Medal (the highest Canadian numismatic award) and the Royal Canadian Mint Medal (presented only to a few people). As well, Jim Charlton's convention registration ribbons from all C.N.A. Conventions ever held will also be on view.

#### BANQUET

The C.N.A. Banquet and the pre-Banquet reception give attendees an opportunity to mingle, enjoy a buffet meal with multiple choices for the main course, listen to an entertaining speaker, win prizes in the free draw and find out first-hand who the recipients of Canada's major numismatic awards are.

Background on the speaker will be published in the next C.N.A. E-Bulletin, as will the details of some of the unusual and unique draw prizes available at the banquet.

#### **OTHER ACTIVITIES PLANNED FOR 2006 CONVENTION**

We are pulling out all stops to assure that all attendees - registrant or daily visitor, male or female, young or old, seasoned numismatist or newcomer, collector or professional - experience fun & fellowship and have the opportunity to view and acquire numismatic material of all description and quality at attractive pricing.
